6.3.1 Curriculum Development

- Tripura University designs the syllabus and as an affiliated college we are obliged to follow the given syllabus. However, the College has requested to the University to include teachers from the college in the syllabus framing committees of Tripura University. As part of this effort, recently three faculty members' names from BBA department were proposed to be part of Board of Undergraduate Studies (BUGS).
- Besides, the Academic Council of the College, studies the syllabus in view of tailoring it to the college standards and ethos. Each department prepares an enriched curriculum with an infusion of human values and provides additional information on the courses such as:
 - Objective of each subject
 - Learning outcomes
 - Additional reading and sources
 - Number of lectures on each subject/course
- The College conducts regular feed backs from students regarding the syllabus and this is forwarded to the concerned department of the University for their consideration.
- The College fulfills all conditions as required by the affiliating university in this regard.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- Highly qualified and dedicated faculty.
- Healthy interaction between students and faculty which goes beyond the classrooms.
- Inter and intra-departmental team teaching practiced by teaching faculty
- Learning beyond curriculum.
- Innovative methods are adopted for teaching and learning process.
- Remedial classes are held for the students requiring additional help.
- Well-equipped library for both faculty and students.
- Good collection of rare and latest books and journals.
- Regular feedback from students to improve teaching and learning methods.
- Vice Principal and Academic Dean looks after the overall academic development of the college.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

 Several faculty members are involved in framing University question papers and evaluate semester examination scripts as and when appointed by Tripura University.

- Both examinations and evaluations are conducted as per instructions given by Tripura University.
- Examination committee ensures smooth conduct of examinations.
- Continuous evaluation through different methods like internal assessment test, sessional examinations, assignments, presentations, group discussions, projects etc.
- Transparency is maintained in evaluation process and students are given access to their answer scripts on request.
- The end semester examination question papers are set by the affiliating university.
- The practical examinations are conducted with internal and external examiners.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- One research project has been approved and funded by Department of Bio-Technology (DBT) this year.
- College provides all support for research and development like sanctioning duty leaves for attending seminars, workshops, conferences and other research activities. The college encourages faculty members to interact with visiting faculty from other institutions, including those from abroad.
- Final year students (all BBA, BA, B.Sc. and B.Com. students) have done projects as part of their syllabus.
- Through the research and development Cell College provides opportunities to students and faculty to conduct research.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- The College has a fully equipped library with automation facilities and online resources.
- A full- fledged Computer laboratory with over 90 computers.
- Smart Classrooms with projectors and computers and white boards.
- Wi-Fi Facility available to faculty and students.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- Faculty and staff are encouraged to participate in faculty-development programmes locally and nationally.
- Administration provides necessary and relevant support to faculty, staff and students to optimize their work.
- College provides facilities like drinking water, computers, air conditioning etc. to teaching staff to enhance their performance.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

- Faculty and staff recruitments are done as per the UGC and Tripura University guidelines.
- Advertisements are given in the leading local newspapers and applications are invited.
- The shortlisted candidates are called for interviews and candidates are chosen with a selection board, which include representatives of University, Management and subject experts.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

• Departments are encouraged to make necessary assignments relevant to industry.

- Industrial visits, lectures by industry experts and domain experts are regularly conducted.
- Students are advised to interact with various industries/institutions individually and the college makes sincere efforts to collaborate with industries and institutions who are willing to cooperate.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

- In keeping with its Minority status, the College has a dynamic admission process which at application level is both online and offline. Once short listing is done candidates are invited for a written test followed by a personal interview and counselling based on which the final selection is done to the various courses.
- As per the seats permitted for each course by the affiliating University, admissions are taken to various courses and seats are filled up.

Introduction

Holy Cross College is a private Catholic institution of higher learning, founded, animated and enlivened by the Congregation of Holy Cross. Holy Cross is a community of scholarship and faith, serving in the field of education worldwide since 150 years and in Agartala from 1970. It is anchored by a belief in the inherent dignity of each person. Holy Cross College is owned and managed by Holy Cross Educational Foundation registered (3612/2000) in accordance with the Societies Registration Act of 1860 to serve efficiently the people of northeast India and Tripura in particular.

Management

A College Managing committee assists the Governing Body of the College for its smooth and efficient functioning.

Aim

To educate the whole personality of the youth, educating their hearts and the minds, so that each Holy Cross student will think, act and lead with courage toward creating a just and peaceful society.

Blessed Basil Moreau (1799-1873)

Basil Moreau the founder of the community of Holy Cross

was born in Lalgne-en-Belin, a town in Le Mans, France on February 11, 1799.

As a priest of the diocese of Le Mans and seminary professor, he established the Association of Holy Cross consisting of two societies, one of men (brothers and priests) and the other of women, both having as principal ministries, the education

of youth. He was raised to the status of Blessed by the Church on September 15, 2007 for living heroic virtues in life . Through the leadership of Blessed Basil Moreau Holy Cross contributed mightily for the building up of France that was devastated by the Revolution.

The men and women of Holy Cross maintain educational institutions as well as important social and pastoral ministries in North and South America, Africa and Asia. Holy Cross has a strong presence in Northeast India since 1853, the then undivided India. Holy Cross Universities, colleges and schools across the world are considered excellent institutions of learning.

Blessed Basil Moreau was an educator with very definite ideas about teaching and learning and about curriculum in terms of both content and methodology. "I have always been convinced that the first duty of every teacher is to produce good human beings; society has a greater need for people of values than it has for scholars. Knowledge itself does not bring about positive values, but positive values do influence knowledge and put it to a good use." Blessed Basil Moreau defined education as something that would make persons better persons with positive human values. When a Holy Cross educator applies his writings to his or her own life situation, he/she tries to translate the founder's words and ideas 'to make persons better persons and better citizens of the society having positive human values." In the words of Blessed Basil Moreau, "We shall always place education side by side with instruction; the mind will not be cultivated at the expense of the heart."

A BRIEF HISTORY OF HOLY CROSS COLLEGE

Holy Cross College, Agartala, a Catholic English Medium Degree College was established in 2009 by Holy Cross Fathers who are the governing body members of Holy Cross Educational Foundation (2000) which is a registered society under the Societies Registration Act of 1860. This society came into existence with the objective of enabling the members of the Society of the Fathers of Holy Cross to efficiently serve the people of Tripura and northeast India through education. The Registration No. is 3612 and it is valid

up to 11/10/2050. Today, this non-profit Foundation (HCEF) has under its umbrella over a dozen English Medium High Schools and many English Medium Higher Secondary schools serving a student population of over 15,000 in the northeastern states of Tripura, Mizoram, Meghalaya and Arunachal Pradesh. Holy Cross Higher Secondary School, Durjoynagar, Agartala, established in 1970 is our premier educational institution in Agartala, W. Tripura.

Initially the College started functioning at the campus of Holy Cross School as infrastructures were being built up in the new campus. The College is affiliated with Tripura University (A Central University). The Permanent Affiliation Reference number is: No.F.TU/DIR.CDC/HC/48/2015 dated 30.03.2016. All the departments of the College, except the B.Ed (Teacher Education) moved to the new College campus at Jubatara, Lembucherra, Agartala in July 2015. Hon'ble Chief Minister of Tripura, Shri Manik Sarkar officially inaugurated the new campus of the College on July 09, 2015.

The First and Founding Principal of the College is Fr. Emmanuel Kallarackal, CSC and he was ably assisted by Fr. Pinto Paul, CSC, the First administrator of the College who was succeeded by Fr. Joe Paul, CSC, Fr. Thomas Pereira CSC, and Fr. Sijo Joseph CSC. The First Vice-Principal of the College was Fr. Davis Konuran, CSC who was succeeded by Sr. Caron BS, Fr. Benny John, CSC, Dr Fr Shajl M.L. CSC & Fr. George Kallungal, CSC has been serving the College as the student councilor since 2009.

Holy Cross persons have been serving people in the field of education through Schools, Colleges and Universities for over the last 160 years. They serve a student population ranging from nursery to Ph.D. worldwide. The education that they try to impart to their students is Holistic.

The College had a gradual increase in its enrolments. It began with the enrolment of 72 students in the first year which increased to 612 students in the seventh year. The students hall from all over the state of Tripura and northeast

India. Since the college does not discriminate and accepts students from all strata of society, there is a wide variety of students both girls and boys, students from various ethnic groups, religions, castes and creeds, making the college a miniature and colourful spectrum of the society of Tripura and northeast India. Our students are hailing from the General Category, SC and OBC as well as from the 19 different tribal groups of Tripura. What is special about Holy Cross College is that it's competent and dedicated teaching faculty, through their hard work and mentoring practices try to make the students excel in their studies and other activities and the proof of it is the excellent results the College brought forth continuously since its birth in the University examinations.

Affiliation

The College is affiliated with Tripura University, (A Central University since 2007).

The College Emblem and the Motto The spirit of the college has been encapsulated in its emblem, which has 6 distinct elements.

- The Cross and anchor signify the Holy Cross identity of the College.
- The symbol of the heart and the book with the burning flame above with its bright red rays signify the Holy Cross charism of 'educating the heart and the mind'.
- 3. The Latin words "Ad Deum Gloria" which translate as 'To God be glory' signify the goal of education namely making students fully alive as human persons since "the glory of God is human fully alive" (St. Irenius, St. Augustine) emphasizing the commitment of the institution to academic excellence and form persons of character.

- The motto, 'Manavanama vikasaya samagrahayam sikha' which translates as 'Holistic education for human enhancement' captures the focus of the College.
- The bamboo signifies the hills and the hills people of the northeast and the paddy represents the plains and the plains people of northeast India.

CAMPUS CULTURE:

Holy Cross College is proud of its eco-friendly, serene and peaceful environment. Smoking and consumption of alcohol and drugs are strictly prohibited. Defacing any part of the campus is treated as an offence. Deeply committed to upholding values system, it expects its students to conduct themselves in a worthy manner in their dress, demeanor and sense of discipline. They must respect their teachers. greeting them when they meet them in or out of the College campus. Students should be seated in their respective classrooms at the stroke of the clock/bell. Action will be taken against students found loitering about in the corridors and making noise. Students are expected to make use of the library during free periods. Movement of students in the corridors of the College buildings during lecture hours is not permitted. Students must possess their identity card and handbook whenever they come to the College and show it to the persons concerned whenever asked for. Students must drive their vehicles always at a moderate speed to avoid any untoward incidents. Students should maintain a sense of decorum and discipline at all times, both inside and outside the campus. Those who are guilty of serious misconduct or whose presence is detrimental to the order and discipline on the campus are liable to be expelled. Code of conduct on the campus includes safeguarding the College Property, keeping the place clean and tidy and following the prescribed dress code. Students should come with clean and proper uniform and avoid Low-waisted pants and dress with modesty and decency.

1. General Norms:

- As Holy Cross is marked by its family spirit the general behaviour and conduct of everyone in the campus is expected to be dignified and cordial, promoting brotherhood and harmony.
- 2) Ragging is a punishable crime under law and if ragging is found in any form or intimidation of any sort he/she will be expelled forthwith and the law of the land will take its own course of action.

- 3) Students should cultivate the habit of reading the instruction/notice on the notice board everyday as soon as they enter the college campus and before they leave the campus.
- 4) Dress Code: All students are expected to follow the dress code of the College.
- 5) The college campus is a smoke/drug free zone.
- 6) Students are expected to use their cell phones responsibly. Taking advantage of the wifi, they may use their cell phones at the college lobby and outside the buildings. Phone should be in the switched off mode during class hours.
- 7) Students must not join any club or society or involve in any engagements that would interfere with their studies without the prior permission of the "Principal/Vice-Principal / Academic Dean".
- 8) Students are not permitted to play in any sports or cultural team against Holy Cross College team.
- 9) Students are forbidden to organize or attend any meeting within the College, or collect money for any purpose or to circulate among the students any notice or petition of any kind or paste it on the College notice board without the written permission of the Principal.
- 10) Active participation in politics is not compatible with the academic life of students and as such students are not expected to indulge in public activities, which are of a political nature.
- 13) Students will not be permitted to make complaints in a body or present any collective petition, but are welcome to present their case, if any, either individually or through their proper representative.
- 14) Teaching-learning is in English Medium.
- 15) The College offers tutorials for deserving students as per their request and Initiatives.
- 16) The college offers transport facilities to those who make the official requisition and pay the fees regularly.

ATTENDANCE

- At Holy Cross College, regular and punctual attendance is absolutely mandatory. If any student is late for his/her class by more than 15 minutes then, he/she is to be considered absent for that class. Attendance for all classes in a day is mandatory. Attendance will be taken separately for each class. Each class will be of 45 minutes duration. Attendance to 6 classes/periods will amount to a day's attendance.
- 75% of attendance is compulsory for being eligible to the College Tests and to apply for the University Examinations. Those having 74%-60% attendance will be considered non-collegiate and those below 60% attendance will be considered as dis-collegiate.
- Shortage of attendance will invite strict censures including monetary penalty. With special permission from the Principal, students may be permitted to make up for the certain percentage of the deficit academic hours by the following: Class seminars, assignments, community services, project submissions and monetary penalty.
- 4. Students who are absent from classes for two weeks or more continuously without the written permission from the Principal/VP/AD, will be considered to have left the College. If they are permitted to join back, re-admission formalities will have to be strictly followed.
- Monthly attendance bulletins are published through the College Notice Board. Students and parents must take note of their attendance status and do their best to ensure the required percentage of attendance.
- 6. In case of genuine need for leave of absence, when the necessity can be foreseen, prior permission from the Principal is to be obtained through an application to the effect from the Parent/Guardian. In case the absence is due to sudden illness or any unforeseen reason, documentary evidence shall be produced on return, not later than 3 days after returning to the class.

- To be promoted to the Major, a student must have minimum 75% attendance in the curricular & cocurricular activities without the assistance of the submission of Leave of Absence document.
- The Principal reserves the right to reject the leave application if he is not satisfied with the authenticity and validity of the reasons stated/documentary proof submitted.
- 9. Attendance for college examinations/internal assessments is absolutely mandatory. Every student is directed to take the college examinations seriously. No student is allowed to leave the examination hall before the expiry of the time. The results of the Examinations along with the Attendance Status will be notified. Fines will be imposed for missing any examinations.
- Attendance for departmental/co-curricular/club activities is compulsory and included in the College Attendance.
- 11. Students who are regular to the classes will be awarded appropriately.

FEE REGULATIONS:

- The fees can be paid for the full year on the day of admission. In such cases it will be collected at the College Office and a 5% concession of tuitions fees will be granted. Fees once paid will not be refunded.
- The fees shall be remitted in the Bank, for which the students shall obtain a fee book from the College office.
- After the payment of the fee, the students must keep the receipt for future reference.
- Absence with or without leave from the College shall not be an excuse for non-payment of fees on the prescribed date.
- A student joining the College after the commencement of the academic year will have to pay the full fee for the year.

- Students are expected to clear all their dues including fine, breakage, damages etc. before collecting the admit card for the University exams.
- 7. Monthly tuition fees have to be paid by the 10th of every month for 12 months.
- The fees for the months of May and June have to be paid by the 10th of April.
- All terms and conditions set forth, including fees and dues are liable to be revised whenever necessary.

CANCELLATION AND REFUND POLICY:

Admission cancellations can be done at the College office from 11.00 am-12.00 noon upto one month after completing the admission formalities. No refund will be done to the students for the amount paid to the college during admission. To be eligible to collect TC, the student should be upto date with payment of fees with no arrears.

LIBRARY RULES:

The lifeline of an educational institution is its library. HCC encourages all students to make use of the library facilities to the maximum. For the organized and effective use of the Library, the following norms shall apply:

- Working Hours: The Library shall be open on all working days, from 09.00 arm to 04.00 pm.
- Every student/staff entering and leaving the Library must sign in the Log Book placed at the counter, with the exact time of entry/exit recorded.
- 3. The books from the Reference Section are not to be taken out of the Library. They are meant for spot reference only. For using a book from the Reference Section, the student may submit his/her ID card to the Librarian, and get the book issued for reference. The book shall be returned before the student leaves the library and the ID card claimed back.

- 4. A student may take a journal/periodical and leave his/her ID card in its place. The student may take back the ID on return of the journal/periodical to its proper place.
- No books/journals/periodicals/newspapers other than the ones issued against one's library cards are allowed to be taken outside the Library.
- No library materials will be issued against borrowed ID Cards. Issues are done in person against one's own ID card.
- 7. A book will be issued for a period of one week only. The books may be returned on any day before the due date. Failure to return the book by the expiry date will cause hardships to others who are in need of the book. Hence, the delay in returning the books will invite a fine of Rs.5/per day. One can renew the book only once and after a gap of one week, the student can take the same book, if available.
- 8. The Library books shall be handled with care, without causing any damage to them. Loss of book/damage should be notified to the Librarian immediately. Damages will have to be paid for the same. If a Library Book is lost, it has to be replaced with a new one within 14 days of the original due date for return. Any delay in replacing the book will invite additional fine. If not replaced, the cost of the current edition of the book +Rs.100 as penalty will be levied against the student.
- Strict silence is to be maintained in the Library. In case of any need, they should meet the librarian.
- Persistent defaulters of various library rules will have their library services suspended.
- No Dues Certificate from the Library is a must for the issue of Admit Card for the University Examinations.

Dress Code:

Note:

On Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays all Students are expected to attend classes in proper college uniform. On wednesdays and saturdays students are free to come in modest and decent dress and attend classes.

Young men:

Pants (Black), Shirts (white with red stripes), and Neck ties (Maroon with College Logo) and Shoes (Black).

Young women: Salwar (Maroon), Kameez (white with red stripes) and Dupatta (maroon with College Logo) and Shoes (Black).

Assessment of Students:

The College does continuous internal assessments of the students through regular tests, projects and assignments. The marks secured by the students at these assessments are considered along with their percentage of attendance before enrolling the student for University examinations. The examination committee's decision in this regard is final and binding.

AWARDS AND SCHOLARSHIPS

To facilitate quality education at affordable cost, HCC makes every effort possible to route the available scholarships for eligible students. It has also instituted its own merit and financial awards as well as scholarships and endowments through the generosity of benefactors.

All awards/scholarships are meant for regular students in "good standing". A student in good standing is defined as follows:

- a. Minimum attendance of 75% in each semester.
- Satisfactory performance in academic and co-curricular activities.
- Good conduct worthy of a student of HCC on and off campus, as detailed in the handbook.

- d. Healthy and appropriate linkages and communications on social net-working sites.
- Abides by the rules and regulations of the College and other regulatory bodies in Higher Education.

NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME (N.S.S.)

The National Service Scheme with its motto, "Not Me But You" underlies that the welfare of an individual is ultimately dependent on the welfare of the society as a whole. The main objective of NSS is to develop the personality of the volunteers through community service. It alms at inculcating amongst the volunteers a spirit of team work, service to the community they live in and character-building which ultimately leads to the development of their personality as a caring human being.

It is the prime objective of the NSS movement that units adopt a village for development and social awareness programmes. Holy Cross College has adopted Jubatara village and the surrounding area of the Jubatara campus. In addition, the College unit conducts a number of regular activities which include Cleaning drives, AIDS awareness program, Blood Donation, observing important events like World Environment Day, World AIDS day and National Integration Week.

Presently Holy Cross College has one unit of NSS with a Program Officer (PO). The Program officer will conduct classes for the students from time to time. In collaboration with the teaching faculty of various departments, the PO also organizes exposure programs.

NATIONAL CADET CORPS (NCC)

The National Cadet Corps (NCC) aims to create organized, trained and motivated youths by developing qualities of leadership, team spirit, secular outlook, ideals of selfless service and spirit of adventure.

Institution:

The National Cadet Corps has its genesis in the "University Corps" which was created under the Indian Defence Act, 1917 with the aim to make up the shortage of the Army. In 1920, when the Indian Territorial Act was passed, the University Corps was replaced by University Training Corps (UTC). In 1942, the University Training Corps was renamed as the University Officers Training Corps (UOTC). In order to create

a youth organization at the national level, a Committee under Pandit HN Kunzru was set up in 1946. Recommendations of this Committee paved the way for the formation of NCC. Thus, the National Cadet Corps came into existence under the National Cadet Corps Act XXXI of 1948 under the Ministry of Defence (MOD).

Alms of NCC

- To develop character, comradeship, discipline, leadership, secular outlook, spirit of adventure and the ideals of selfless service amongst the youth of the country.
- To create a human resource of organized, trained and motivated youth, to provide leadership in all walks of life and always available for the service of the nation.
- To provide a suitable environment to motivate the youth to take up a career in the Armed Forces.

Motto

The motto of NCC is "Unity and Discipline".

Growth

The Corps which started in a small way with a cadet strength of 1.67 lakhs had grown to 13 lakhs in 2008. The net work of 774 NCC Units are spread all over the country through 4880 College as 7783 schools according to the information available in 2008. Today, the number of Cadets would have crossed a few more lakhs and the number of units would have gone up by a few more thousands.

The National Cadet Corps was given an inter service image in 1950 when the Air Wing was added, followed by the Naval Wing in 1952. Earlier, in 1949, the Girls' Division had been brought in to give equal opportunity to school and college going girls of the nation. In 1952, the NCC curriculum was extended to include community development as part of the NCC syllabus.

Activities

The activities of NCC can be broadly divided into the following distinct categories described below:-

- Institution Training.
- Community Development Programs cum Social

Service Activities.

- Youth Exchange Programmes.
- Adventure Training & Sports.

Advisory Committee

There are two advisor Committees. The Central Advisory Committee (CAC) is the highest policy making body at the National Level. State Advisory Committee (SAC) is shared by the Chief Ministers of the respective States.

Benefits of NCC Cadets

NCC Scholarship Scheme

Scholarship of Rs. 5,000/- each per annum to 500 deserving NCC cadets who have excelled in academics. Award of Rs. 3,000/- each to the best cadets and Rs. 2000/- each to the second best cadets in each group.

Annual Sahara Scholarship

- a) Sahara Group of Companies have formulated a scheme for granting scholarship to cadets as under:-
- Rs. 5,000/- each for 368 cadets of Junior Division/Junior Wing (JD/JW).
- Rs. 15,000/- each for 386 cadets of Senior Division/Senior Wing (SD/SW).
- III. Rs. 40,000/- each for 66 cadets for higher studies.
- b) All cadets are to apply through their respective NCC Unit/Wing.

HIGHLIGHTS OF LU. RULES AND REGULATIONS OF CREDIT BASED SIX-SEMESTER DEGREE PROGRAMME OF B.A/B.SC.B.COM. (GENERAL AND HONOURS)

(Effective from 2014-2015 Session)

DEGREE AND DURATION OF STUDIES

SHORT TITLE, DEFINITION AND COMMENCEMENT:

- These Regulations shall be called "The Regulations of Credit based Six- Semester Degree Programmes of BA/BSc/B.Com (General and Honours).—
- These regulation shall be applicable to the students enrolled for BA/B.Sc/ B.Con (General & Hons) Programmes of Tripura University in the Credit based Semester System.
- These Regulations shall come into effect from the Undergraduate Academic Session 2014-2015.

 There shall be programmes of study leading to the Degrees of Bachelor of Arts(BA), Bachelor of Science (B.Sc.), Bachelor of Commerce (B.Com), Bachelor of Arts with Hons (BA(Hons)), Bachelor of Science with Hons (B.Sc(Hons)), Bachelor of Commerce with Hons (B.Com (Hons)), Each program shall be of six Semesters duration leading to either Three Year Degree Programme (General) (TDPG) or Three Year Degree Programme (Honours) (TDPH) Degree in respective programmes under Tripura University.

Definitions:

- Academic Year: An 'academic year' means a period of twelve months consisting of two Semesters.
- Course: 'Course' means a segment of subject matter to be covered in a Semester. A course may be considered as a paper in conventional education system.
- Compulsory: 'Compulsory' courses mean such courses that a student has to compulsorily study during the semesters as prescribed by the university.

- Credit: 'Credit' (Cr) of a course is a measure of the weekly unit of the work assigned for the course. One Credit is a measure consisting of 1 contact hour per week in Theory, 2 contact hours per week in Practical and 3 contact hours per week in Field Study. For Theory/Practical papers for 100 marks, there will be 4 credit usually. For Project paper the credit will be 6 and for FNDC(English)/FNDC (Computer Skill) the credit will be 5 each.
- Credit Grade Point: Credit Grade Point' (P) of a Course in the value obtained by multiplying the Grade Point (G) by the Credit (Cr) of the Course: P= G x Cr.
- CGPA: 'Cumulative Grade Point Average' (CGPA) is the value obtained by, dividing the sum of Credit Grade Pts in oil course token by a student for the entire Prramm)p total number of credits and shall be rounVj'vQ decimal places.
- Grade: 'Grade' tneeotire/programme is a letter symbol (0, A+, A, B+ B, C, F) which indicates the comparative level of performance of a student in a course/programme.
- Grade Card: 'Grade Card' is a card containing grades secured by a student in each Course/Programme in a Semester-based Programme, together with his/her SGPA and CGPA.
- Programme: 'Programme' means the entire course of study and examinations in a particular field of study.
 Subject: A 'subject' is the main discipline of a department of study. If there is only one course in a subject in any part, the course shall be treated as a subject.
- SGPA: Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) is the value obtained by dividing the sum of Credit Grade Points(P) obtained by a student in the various courses taken in a semester by the total number of credits taken by him/her

in that semester. The Grade Poini shall be rounded off to two decimal places. SGPI determines the overall performance of a student a' the end of a semester.

There shall be six Semesters in both TDP (General) an TDP (Hans) of Three year duration. In each year ther shall be two semesters:

First Year : First and Second Semester Second Year : Third and Fourth Semester Third Year : Fifth and Sixth Semester.

Semesters Classification:

Odd Semesters (First, Third and Fifth): July — December Even Semesters (Secord Fourth and Sixth): Janual June.

The Degrees of Arts or of Science or of Commerce i TDP (Genecal & TDP (HonOurs Shall be awarded on on successful contletions all the Semester Examinations.

The Final results will be given on the basis marks/grade obtained in 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th an 6th semester Examinations taken together.

In case of Arts or Science Programme the ter "Subject" occurring in the following paragraphs sh mean a "Specified subject of study", whereas in case of Commerce it shall mean concerned "Group of subject".

ELIGIBILITY FOR ADMISSION

Any student passing H.S(+2) examination or its equivalent with at least 4 subjects including English from any recognized Board/Council shall be eligible for admission to the 1st Semester of the B.A/B.Sc/B.Com (Honours/General) Programme of studies subject to availability of seats and restriction of combination of subjects However, no student shall be allowed for admission into 1st Semester course of studies after a lapse of more than 5(five) years from the year of passing the previous qualifying

examination. (Explanation: The year of admission shall not be taken into account while calculatin five years from the year of passing the previous qualifying examination.

(**Explanation**: The year of admission shall not be taken into account while calculating five years from the year of passing the previous qualifying Examination).

- Any student passing H.S (+2) examination or its equivalent with at least 4 Subjects including English from any recognized Board/Council shall be eligible for admission to the 1st Semester of the B.A. (Hons)/ B.Sc (Hons)/ B.Com (Hons) programme of studies subject to availability of seats and restriction of combination of subjects and provided that he/she has secured in that examination, at least.
- 40% marks in aggregate and 45% marks the subject in which he/she seeks Honours
- 35% marks in the concerned subject (Group 8CoLrS)
- I Any one securing at least 50% marks in aggregate shall be eligible for taking Honours in a subject, which he/she did not study in H.S. (+2) examination or its equivalents subject to restriction of combination o subjects.
- A student seeking admission to B.Com (Honours) programme must fulfill the conditions as laid down below in addition to conditions.
- Has secured at least 40% marks in Mathematics at Madhyarnik or its equivalent examination.

OR

 Must have passed H.S(+2) or equivalent examination with Mathematics

OR

Must have passed the two Commerce papers.

Admission test be taken by the college in case the number of students seeking admission to Honours programme exceeds the number of intake capacity in a particular Honours subject approved by the University.

- A student shall not be allowed to take Honours in a subject in which he/she has falled in H.S. (+2) examination or its equivalent but subsequently passed as a compartmental Condidate.
- All admission processes to Rist Semester classes in the affiliated Degree Colleges shall be completed latest by, 10th July of each academic year, in case of other semester, provisional admission to subsequent semester classes be completed within fifteen days from the date of completion of porevious semester examination.
- A student shall have to apply with 1 copy of recent passport size photo for university registration in prescribed form within 30 days from the last date of admission. No. application for registration will be entertained after the expiry of this stipulated period.
- A student shall be allowed to change a subject (s)/ stream within 15 days from his/her Admission to the College, subject to the restriction of combination of subjects laid down by the respective college. No such change shall be entertained once application for University registration is forwarded to the University from the college.
- No student shall be allowed to prosecute two regular programmes offered by the Tripura University simultaneously.
- In regard to marks bar for admission against reserve seats/quotes for ST/SC/PH/OBC Candidates the guidelines /instructions of UGC will be followed from time to time.

- Since the semester involved continuous assessment ther would be no scope for a student to appear as a privat student in any subject.

- A student must pass all his/her semester examination within six years from the date of admission to the fir semester classes.

Evalutation of the student performanC in each of the theory and practical courses. Evaluation the student performance in each of the theory an practical course will be based on the following internal Evaluation: 20% marks. External Evaluation: 80% marks.
- Internal Evaluation shall be based on two session examinations and seminari Group Discussion etc.
- The medium of instructions for TDP(General) and TDP(Hol shall be in English and the Candidates will be required answer preferably in English other than language subject The question papers shall be set only in English (Other th language subjects) for Honours as well as General pap of different subjects.

Examination

Examination regulations for B.A. /B.Sc./ B.Com.(Honours and general) Programmes of Studies introduced from the academic Session 2014-2015 under Credit Based Semester Examination system.

GENERAL PROVISIONS

- A Student may be considered eligible to appear at any Semester examination held at the end of the semester provided shell he has secured pass mails in internal Assessment and has attended 75% of the total classes held, both in theory and practical separately in each Semester and has fulfilled all other conditions as laid down in these Regulations. Percentage of attendance in a subject I group of subjects in a group of subject in a semester shall be calculated from the date of commencementseS in collage in the respective semester and not from the date of admission of a student in that polemester.
- A student be allowed to sit for any semester Examinational Non-Collegiate andidcite, lie /she has attended minimum 65% of classes held in Theory and Practiccit separately in each semester and on deposits of requisite amount of fees determined by the University from time to time.
- A student having attended below .65%65% Theoretical & 65% Practical classes) of the dasses held in any Semester shall be declar&t as -Collegiate and he i she not be allowed to appear at the Semester-I I Semester-II I Semester III / Semester-IV / Semester-V and Semester-V Examinations and shall have to be readmitted.
- A student will be eligible to appear as a student in the End Semester Examination of the University if he I she secures atleast 40% marks (i.e. 8 marks) in the Internal Assessment portion. That is, no student will be allowed to appear in the End-Semester Examination of the University if hel she falls to secure minimum 40% marks in the internal Assessment portion.

- It shall be duty of the Principal of the concerned College I institute to announce in consultation with the Heads of the Departments the names of students who are found not eligible to appear in the End-semester Examinations in the various courses due to non-fulfillment of the criteria of Internal assessment and attendance.
- The students shall be informed in advance about the schedule of internal Assessment.
- The affiliated colleges shall have to submit the Internal assessment marks in prescribed mark-slips to the Controller of Examinations seven days before the commencement of End-Semester Examination of the University.
- A student having lactical paper shall have to submit compulsorily the PrQal Note Books sel by the concerned Teacher a\$n'e of exgrnTnotlogostudent shall be allowed ta'dppéar in the iractical ExàrñihOtions if he I she falls to produce laboratory / Practical Note Book duly signed by the subject teachers of the concerned College.
- Principals of respective colleges will arrange to submit the filled in application forms along with requisite fees after due authentication of the entries of the application form to the Office of the Controller of Examinations. TU within the stipulated date to be fixed by the Controller of Examinations.
- No application form will be entertained after the expiry of the stipulated dote.
- At the time of filling up of application form a student shall have to read the instructions carefully laid down for appearing at the examination.
- Admit card for an examination shall not be issued in favour of a student unless his I her application is dully filled-up in all respects particularly in regards to:
 - a) date of admission to the class of the concerned Semester, b) year of first appearance in the examination of the Semester concerned and C) year (s) of appearance in the Semester-I/ Semester-II / Semester-III / Semester-IV / Semester-V / and Semester-VI Examinations, as the case may be, together with the results thereof and such other information as may be required from time to time and duly endorsed by the Principal

testifying his / her a)good conduct, b) satisfactory performance at the internal Assessment Examinations and requisite attendance record in theoretical and practical classes in each of the subjects in which he I she intends to appear.

- A student appearing at any Semester Examination of the B.A. / B.Sc. / B.Com./ (Honours and General) courses shall submit with his I her application form such fees as may be prescribed from time to time by the University.
- A student who pass[lify or to present himself/herself at an the requirements for the rec to claim refund of fees.
- A student who applies for admission to subsequent examination (s) shall be required to pay on each occasion such fees as prescribed by the University from time to time.
- A student declared as person with disability (PWD) and Blind by the appropriate authorities shall be exempted from paying the fees forUniversity Examinations. An Amelinuensis may be engaged for writing answer on behalf f such PWD/ Blind Student with the prior written permission of the Controller of Examinations, TU. Such amanuensis shall be entitled to remuneration to be paid by the University as may be prescribed.
- A student who (I) has completed his / her course of study of a Semester but falls to enroll himself / herself to appear at any Semester examination, or (II) falls to appear at the Examination after getting duly enrolled, or (III) has been declared "Falled's in that Examination, may be allowed to appear at the subsequent examinations within his I her stipulated chances as a continuing student on submission of prescribed Application Forms and Fees within the stipulated date determined by the University.
- A students sha II be deemed to have appeared at an examination whenever Admit card is issued in his /her favour by the University.
- An examination shall be held always under the current syllabus.
- There will be no Post-Publication Re-Examination of Answer Scripts. However, a student may apply for inspection of Answer Scripts of Theory paper only as per relevant rules in this regard.
- Practical examination of a semester shall ordinarily be held prior to the Semester-end examinations.

Examination and Evaluation:

- End Semester Examinations: The controller of examinations shall make necessary arrangement for notifying the dates of the End-Semester Examinations as per the ocademic Calendar notified by the university.
- Improvement Examination: A student after passing the 6th Semester Examination may opt for improvement Examinations' once in any two theory courses (Papers) of any of the stx Semesters after passing the Sixth Semester Examination. However, the higher marks secured by the student shall be retained. Such a student shall have to apply in the prescribed form alongwith requisite fee for improvement Examinations within the stipulated date fixed for the concerned Semester Examination. No improvement examination shall be allowed in the practical examinations.

Results:

- A student shall be declared as passed in a course (Paper) in a semester examination, provided he / she secures atleast 40% marks in the Course (Paper) including internal Assessment. Further provided that in case of Course (Paper) having Practical component a student shall have to secure 40% Marks separately in Theory and Practical Component.
- A student shall be declared as successful (S) in a semester Examination, provided he / she passes all the courses (papers) of a semester independently.
 - Provided however that a student shall declared as Qualified with Back Paper(s) in a Semester, if he/she has not more than two back papers in all Semesters taken together inclusive of the Back Paper in the current Semester subject to Conditions laid down in (d) below.
- A student qualified to the next higher Semester with Back Paper(s) is considered eligible to appear at the higher Semester Examination provided he / she fulfill all other conditions laid down in this regulation. Such a student has to appear only in the Back Paper(s) of earlier Semester examination along with the appropriate higher Semester Examination (i.e. Odd to Odd and Even To Even).

- A student will be declared as qualified in a Semester Examination if.
- The number of Back Papers Ina Semester Examination does not exceed two:
- The number of Cumulatte Back Papers however be four at maximum in the stage of Second Semester and
- From 3rd Semester Examination onward the number of Cumulcifive black papers will be Six at the maximum.
- The result student of Sixth semester shall be declared as Result withheld (RW) If-
- He / She hs passed all the course (Papers) of Six Semester but has back. Paper(s) in any previous Semester.
- He / She has four back papers of previous Semester and a maximum of two back paper of sixth Semester.
- In case of RW result, Mark Sheet will not be issued until a student clears the Back Paper(s) in such cases, the date of publication of final result will be the date on which the student will clear the Back Paper(s)
- A student shall be declared to have passed the Stx-Semester BA / B.Sc | B.Com programme provided he / she has passed all the Semester examination separately.
- Pass marks secured by a student in any Semester examination in any course (paper) will remain at his / her credit.
